In his book Good to Great, Jim Collins discussed "the flywheel effect." He compares it to a mechanical flywheel, which uses small, repeated efforts to gradually build up momentum. Once enough momentum is generated, the wheel keeps spinning on its own with little extra effort.

In Cabarrus County, our economic development flywheel is spinning. As I reviewed the achievements outlined in this annual report, I see all of the small efforts that have created our economic development momentum. Our continued partnership with Flywheel (I wonder where they got that name?) is building our entrepreneurial community through the recruitment and support of entrepreneurs. Our focus on existing industry, through our Made in Cabarrus series, our newly constituted Industry Council and our continued outreach via existing business visits is building on the success of the companies that built Cabarrus.

At the Grounds at Concord, we not only are executing on the buildout of the new Lilly manufacturing facility but engaging with stakeholders to prepare the site for the next project to be announced. That preparation continues across the county, with 1.3 million square feet of speculative space added this year and an anticipated 3 million square feet starting in FY25. At the same time, we are engaging our partners in the workforce development arena to prepare Cabarrus residents to capitalize on new job opportunities.

A flywheel is a mechanical marvel. Once it starts spinning, it can keep spinning even when it's not being powered. The flywheel's momentum keeps powering the machine. But it is important to note that the flywheel is not self-powered. Without additional force being applied, it will eventually stop. And once it stops, it requires tremendous effort to get it moving again.



CMC Dry Ice, CMC Industrial Services of North Carolina, LLC, Coleman Industrial Gases, LLC



The Coleman family has transformed their business into a multifaceted enterprise, pioneering in industrial cleaning using innovative techniques such as dry ice blasting, which has been employed in various notable locations for its efficiency and lack of secondary waste.

In 2020, the family ventured into dry ice manufacturing, becoming the only independent manufacturer in the Carolinas, significantly optimizing operational efficiency and opening new revenue streams.








■ REQUEST FOR INFORMATION (RFI) ROADMAP



REFERRAL SOURCE




PROJECTS BY TYPE/INDUSTRY


